About Madison Public Library

Madison Public Library consists of a Central Library and eight neighborhood libraries. Founded in 1875, the first Madison library operated out of two rooms in City Hall, then moved to a Carnegie funded building in 1906. The library opened its first branch library in 1914 in a working-class neighborhood, offering educational opportunities on Sundays for immigrant families and workers. Additional branches have been added throughout the decades to accomodate the growing population, and these libraries continue to expand and evolve to meet the ever-changing needs of its communities.

Madison Public Library's tradition of promoting education, literacy and community involvement has enriched the City of Madison for more than 140 years. Madison libraries welcome more than 2.17 million visits annually. Library visitors check out more than 3.8 million items per year. Madison Public Library is part of the South Central Library System, a network of 53 public libraries in a sevencounty area that share an online catalog, daily materials delivery and reciprocal borrowing privileges.

Madison Public Library is highly committed to its community and demonstrates this by carrying out its mission and vision through its core services and through a focus on customer and civic engagement. Some recent intiatives include early literacy efforts delivered through home health nurses, services for homeless individuals, an artist in residence program, a community kitchen, a tool for gathering community feedback outside the library's walls, and the Tell Us community planning project for Madison's east side.

Madison Public Library partners with organizations in the city, including Madison Metropolitan School District, UW-Madison, United Way, YWCA, Centro Hispano, Literacy Network, and others. City of Madison parterships include extending services for voting and elections; cooperation with the Parks Department and Madison Arts Commission; and the library participates in all Neiborhood Resource Teams in the city.

Efforts like these have received national recognition from a variety of organizations like the Institute for Museum and Library Service, which honored Madison Public Library with the National Medal in 2016.

Governance

The Madison Public Library is governed by a nine-member Board of Directors, appointed for three year terms by the Mayor of Madison. The Board's authority to oversee the policies and direction of the Library is derived from Chapter 43 of Wisconsin statutes. The Library Board works in conjunction with the Mayor, library staff, and the Madison Common Council to plan, fund and implement public library service in Madison.


